## Woody Meadow Project

One of our volunteers, Jenny McCausland, recently suggested Greenlink trial the 'Woody Meadow' method of developing low-maintenance public plantings, where a diverse range of plant species are established and then regularly coppiced to create a bushy and aesthetically pleasing landscape. We have set aside a 3m x 3m plot at the rear of the nursery for this project.

The Woody Meadow trials conducted by the University of Melbourne used native plants, but Greenlink would like to trial indigenous species that we grow. Whitehorse Council has advised that they are aware of the Woody Meadow concept but are yet to trial it, so are taking a keen interest in our project. Over the next few months we will provide updates so you can see how we are progressing with this exciting project!

Here is an excerpt from "Woody Meadows greening our cities the right way" by Associate Professor Claire Farrell and Dr Rachael Bathgate, Melbourne University:

"In the face of rapid urban growth and climate change, there's a critical need for new landscape approaches in our cities – plantings that are beautiful, functional and deliver significantly more benefits to people and biodiversity than traditional, low-maintenance landscapes.

Woody Meadows are highly adaptable and can be used in a wide range of urban settings including railway easements and roadside verges, roundabouts, parks and gardens, and as part of water sensitive urban designs like raingardens and retention basins."

## Save Lake Knox donation

### GREENLINK SUPPORTS A WORTHY CAUSE

Lake Knox is a naturalised wetland in the heart of Knox, which currently supports a range of rare and endangered flora and fauna, including the iconic Blue-billed Duck, (pictured below) which is endangered in Victoria.

Development Victoria intends to fill in Lake Knox for a new blank canvas on which to meet stormwater requirements so that they can build medium-density housing developments onsite.

Knox Environment Society (KES), in conjunction with First Friends of Dandenong Creek (FFDC) and Friends of Lake Knox Sanctuary (FOLKS) have been running a crowd-funding campaign to petition the State Government to listen to the wishes of the community, to preserve and protect the high value biodiversity of this lake.

Greenlink has made a donation of \$1000 to KES to go toward this campaign.

## President's Report

BY ROBERT JONES, AS PRESENTED AT THE AGM

Early next month Greenlink will be celebrating its 35th birthday. Who would have thought 35 years ago when Minette first laid the foundations and formed Greenlink declaring that she would turn Box Hill green, that Greenlink would have evolved into what we have today and in fact continued to grow from strength to strength over all these years. A true testament to those who founded Greenlink, and a real acknowledgement of the hard work and dedication of our current volunteers and those who went before us. Over the past 12 months we have propagated just on 55,500 plants an increase of 16% on the previous year and put in 6,200 hours of volunteer work which is 20% more than last year, an amazing effort by all of our volunteers.

With covid now well behind us we have put a major effort back into the parkland around the nursery removing 2 years growth of weeds, clearing and mulching the beds and beginning replacing many of the plants that had died or are now beyond their life cycle. I am sure many of you will have noticed the difference in the appearance of the park area around the nursery.

In regards to our financial position on which our Treasurer Trevor will give more details, sales for the year were just on \$68,000 which was 18% up on the previous year. Overall gate sales were just over \$32,000 slightly down on last year where we had large volumes of click and collect sales in the latter days of the covid lockdown. This represents 48% of all sales. On the other hand orders saw a massive increase to just on \$36,000 which represents 52% of our total sales. We once again continue to see the ongoing growing demand for our plants from our customers and there would appear to be no reason why this will not continue. From what I understand the other community based nurseries in Eastern suburbs all report the same strong demand for indigenous plants.

## 3CR Gardening Show

For the last two years Greenlink has been a supporter of the 3CR Gardening Show, and was very pleased to make a donation to the Radiothon and help to keep 3CR community radio on air.

The Gardening Show is on every Sunday morning, and provides its listeners with plenty of inspiration, ideas and knowledge on a range of environmental & horticultural issues.

## President's Report cont...

Our membership base has remained at a strong level with 101 members as at the end of June.

A few of the highlights of the year have been:

🍂 \$8,000 donated back into the community to our local schools, the Colts girls netball club and a contribution to KES Nursery to their fighting fund to protect Lake Knox from being developed into a housing estate

🍂 \$2,500 worth of plants donated through the Gardens for Wildlife program and Council calendar vouchers

🍂 As part of Sustainability week we sponsored a public seminar at the Whitehorse Town Hall with a talk by Richard Rowe from Sustainable Gardening Australia on Climate Action Through Gardening attended by around 70 people

🍂 Held a seminar at the nursery for 40 people given by one of our volunteers Dr Augustine Doronila on the Curiosity of Seeds

🍂 We are now carbon neutral in our energy needs with our solar panels generating almost 3 times the amount of electricity than we use.

🍂 Once again we hosted visits by the year 1&2 students from Kerrimuir Primary School and Box Hill Nth Primary school

🍂 Have installed a new watering system in the nursery that will give us more flexibility and efficiency in its use.

🍂 Continued expanding our activities in the parkland around the nursery getting rid of the weeds and dead plants that had accumulated during the lock downs and planted out many new trees/shrubs and wildflowers and rejuvenated the front of the Nursery along the footpath.

🍂 Held 5 very successful sale days.

🍂 Participated along with Bungalook at Spring festival giving away over 1,000 free plants

🍂 Completed reviewing and updating our operational policies, a large task done by a dedicated team of a sub committee

Once again with the outlook being for ongoing and continued growth in demand for our plants the challenge ahead given the space limitations we have at the nursery is to be able have enough stock of plants on the benches to meet the demand of our clients. At present demand is outstripping our ability to supply, this is also the case for a couple of other indigenous nurseries from what I hear. As I mentioned previously this is likely to continue into the future as the environment continues to take a higher profile in our daily lives and, with the expansion of nature strip plantings and the gardens for wildlife program there is a growing awareness in the community about planting indigenous plants.

We continue to remain in a very healthy situation with strong finances, a loyal and growing customer base, and a competent and dedicated group of volunteers.

In closing I would like to express our thanks to the City of Whitehorse Parks and Natural Environment team for their continued assistance, our local ward Councillor Blaire Barker and our friends at Bungalook Nursery for their ongoing partnership and relationship with Greenlink.

I also express my deep appreciation to all of our volunteers for your work, contribution and dedication for without your efforts and support Greenlink not be able to exist and function the way we do. You are all amazing contributors the way you give your time so freely, my deepest thanks to all of you.

Lastly to my fellow committed members, thank you for your ongoing support and the time you put into making sure that Greenlink functions successfully and the contribution you have all been to me as President.

Thanking you all, it has once again been a privilege to serve as President of Greenlink.

## Treasurer's Report

BY TREVOR EDDY, AS PRESENTED AT THE AGM

Our overall trading result for the year ended 30th June 2023 was a net surplus of \$34,239.

Income was \$74,169 (up 22%) and Expenses were \$39,930 (up by 32%) which included \$7,000 in community donations and purchase of a new watering system.

We saw a 52% increase in Invoiced Sales and although our gate sales were down on last year, we achieved an increase in sales of 18% year on year to \$68,300.

We were delighted that we achieved the highest membership levels in our history recording 101 members.

And thanks to the rise in interest rates (for us anyway) our investment income was significantly higher at \$4433. With assets of \$383,344 minus a couple of late month accounts outstanding we had \$381,121 in equity an increase of \$37,106.

It's fair to say we are in good shape and have pretty much future proofed the nursery from a financial perspective.

## Community Activities

Over the past several weeks we have been out and about in the community spreading the word about planting indigenous plants to nurture our environment. These activities have included the following and have been very rewarding for those involved and we look forward to being able to do more of this type of work:

🛠️ On 28 July we gave a presentation to around fourteen people from the Mont Albert probus club garden group about the history and activities of Greenlink. Many of them already knew about Greenlink and our activities and it was good to see a few familiar faces and learn of their interest in our indigenous plants and how they are using them in their gardens.

## You'll larvae this!

ANOTHER REASON TO  
GROW MORE MISTLETOE

What on earth is in the photo below....??

Well, it's a cluster of larvae (also known as caterpillars) of the beautiful Imperial Jezebel butterfly, spotted in Vermont by members of our seed team over Winter.

Mistletoe is the host plant used by the Jezebel to breed, and on which the larvae will feed exclusively. They also produce a loose silken web, which they adhere to when resting. The butterflies are one of the first to emerge in Spring.

Mistletoes are vital to biodiversity, as you can see here in this one example, and we need to do all we can to protect them. Jezebel thanks you!!

## Community Activities cont...

👉 On 31 July we hosted a group of 17 year 11 VCAL students from Mulluana college who were interested to learn how a volunteer organisation like our operates, why we grow indigenous plants and what it takes for a group of people to manage a nursery without any paid professional staff. This was a very engaging couple of hours and we were very impressed by the interest and maturity of these young people, the next generation as our future. They spend a couple of days a their school, 1 day doing an on the job apprenticeship and 1 day a TAFE, a full schedule for these teenagers.

👉 On 8 August morning we hosted another group of 15 year 11 VCAL students from Blackburn North High School. Our volunteers working in the park that morning each worked with two to four students on a particular task. The students were a great group taking on tasks like weeding, planting out a range of plants in some new areas we have created, preparing a bed for planting out a trial area for a woody meadow project we are undertaking and assisting us in the area next to the pond being planted more densely with a range of plants.

We look forward to building a longer term relationship with both these local schools and trust that these events will happen on a more regular basis.

👉 On 15 August we gave another presentation about Greenlink and our activities to the Box Hill Garden Club, who hold their meetings across the road in the clubrooms at Springfield Park, very convenient for us.

Again it was good to see a few familiar faces and learn of their interest in our plants and why we grow them and how a group of only volunteers are able to manage what we achieve. They were very impressed that we had been going for 35 years and can grow and sell so many of our local plants back into the community.

David passed away suddenly at his home and he will be missed around the nursery.



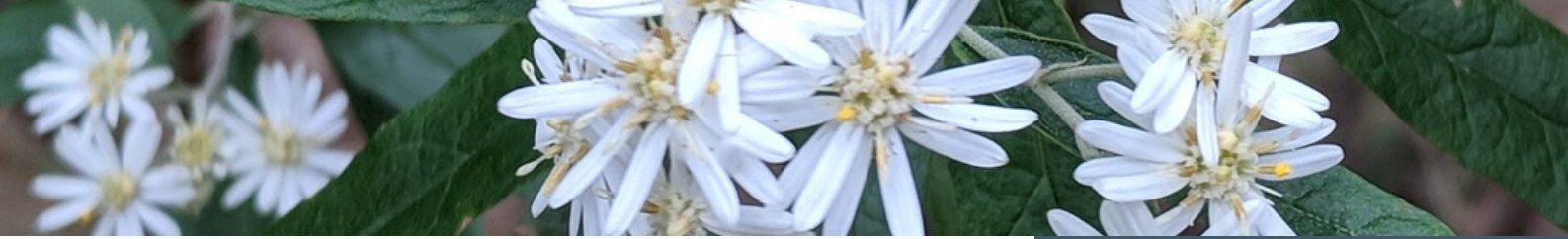

EUCALYPTUS GLOBOIDEA

Common Name: White Stringybark  
Height: 10-30m  
Width: 8-20m  
Habit: Upright medium tree with compact canopy. Thick rough fibrous stringy bark to the small branches.  
Flowers: Clusters of stalkless buds with pointed caps and creamy-white flowers Sept-Jan.



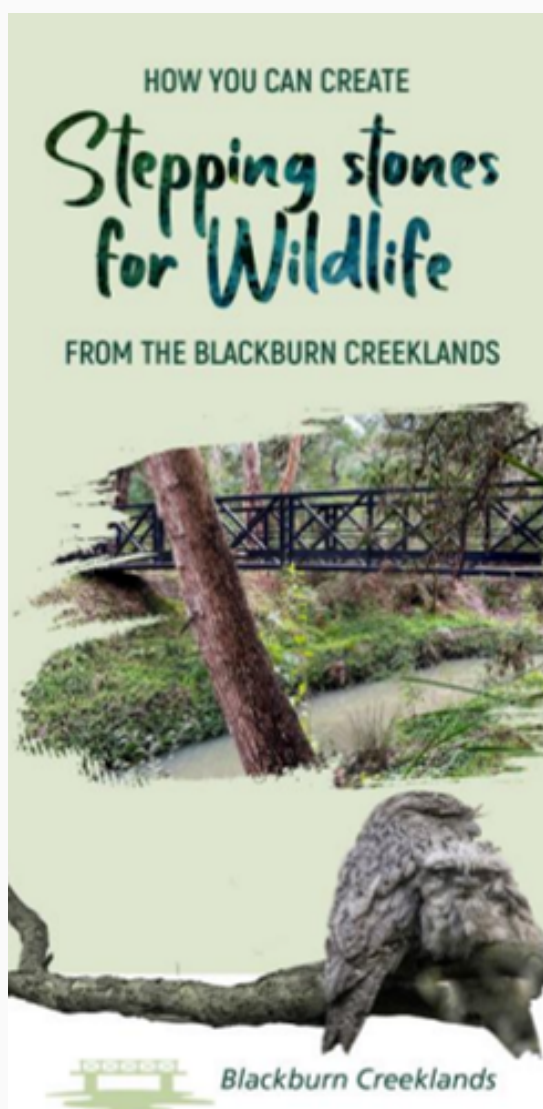


## Stepping Stones for Wildlife

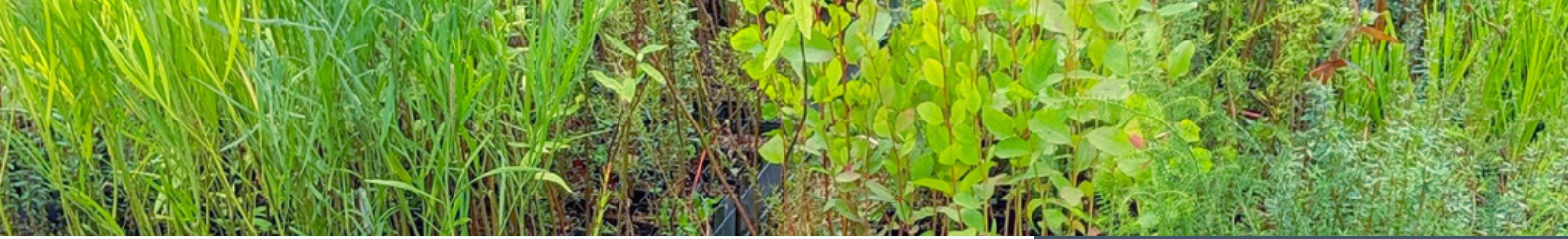
