#### **Stepping Stones for Wildlife**

HOW LINKING UP ISOLATED HABITATS CAN HELP NATURE THRIVE IN OUR CITIES

Observing local wildlife in our gardens or nearby parkland is always a delightful experience.

However, what happens when native wildlife faces barriers like busy roads, open sports fields, and threats from feral predators, preventing them from seeking food, nesting spots, and mates in surrounding areas? This issue is known as habitat fragmentation, posing a significant challenge in many urban areas.

In an article written by Thami Croeser and Holly Kirk, published recently in The Conversation, they say that by putting more effort and attention on strategically located green spaces that link up these fragmented areas, we can create corridors for our wildlife to move around more easily and safely:

"Despite the myriad challenges facing plants, animals and insects in urban areas, cities are important places to take care of our native species. Urban areas still offer valuable nesting and feeding resources, especially for tree-dwelling mammals, canopy-feeding birds and water-adapted species."

#### **President's Report**

Well, another year has slipped under the radar and in September we have our 36th year of Greenlink to celebrate, an amazing achievement for a group of volunteers, and a past vision by Minette Russell Young that we have kept going and growing in strength over all these years.

Once again we have had a strong 12 months, with around 52,000 plants pricked out and just on 6,300 hours of volunteer work, which is on par with the previous 12 months. This is a stable result for us and in line with keeping the capacity of what we can produce at the upper levels, given the constraints on the space and infrastructure of our site, and it is also at a level that we can actually manage.

Our financial position remains in a strong state, and our treasurer Trevor will advise more details when he speaks. However just few details are: our overall sales were just on \$70,000 with gate sales just on \$33,000, both in line with last year's results. This represents 47% of our sales as gate sales and 53% as invoiced sales, again similar to the previous year's results and, as previously mentioned, at levels that we can manage with our resources. Demand however continues to grow and there have been several requests for substantial large orders that are simply beyond our ability to supply and that we have subsequently had to decline.

Already current indications are for another 12 months of strong demand for indigenous plants, and from talking with other community and indigenous nurseries, we are all facing a similar level of strong demand which in many cases exceeds the ability to supply. The growing strength in the community of our environment and use of indigenous plants, I suggest, is the main reason behind this strong and growing demand for plants.

# Eucalypts of Yarran Dheran

July, 26 On two Greenlink volunteers attended a Eucalypt Walk at Yarran Dheran, facilitated the bv Whitehorse Council Education Tree Program. We used several key identifying features to determine the species of some of the Eucalypt canopy within trees the reserve.

#### President's Report cont...

Membership has remained at strong levels with currently just on 108 members at the end of June, and we continue to have people call into the nursery to sign up as members and volunteer to work.

A few brief highlights of the past 12 months have been:

- We donated \$12,000 back into the community to various organisations such as Yarran Dheran and Blackburn Lake for their visitor centres, our local primary schools and kindergarten, the Colts Netball club, two newly formed park Friends Groups and Box Hill Hospital for their new stroke imaging machine.
- We donated just on \$4,000 worth of plants to the Gardens for Wildlife program and the council calendar vouchers.
- We held a public seminar at Box Hill Town Hall as part Whitehorse's sustainability program, on planting out your nature strip, and an event at our Nursery on native grasses given by one of our volunteers Dr Augustine Doronila.
- We have had various visits to the nursery by students from our local primary schools and hosted meetings from the Gardens for Wildlife programs of both Whitehorse and Monash council, and given various talks to local Rotary Clubs and garden groups on the history and activities of Greenlink.
- Many hundreds of hours of work have been put into the parkland area around the nursery weeding, rebuilding a portion of the pond, creating new display beds, planting hundreds of plants and rebuilding the front garden beds. This has made an amazing difference to the parkland, completely transforming the area we manage

In partnership with Bungalook we gave away 1,400 plants at Spring Festival.

#### President's Report cont...

Over the coming 12 months we are in the process of increasing our bench space with 2 new rows of benches to allow more flexibility in holding plants on order (this has just been completed), moving into trialling seed production areas for plants that are becoming more difficult to source seed from bushland areas, and installing permanent shade sails at the front of the shed. We would also like to study the better utilisation of the shed and any required layout changes.

Given the likely outlook for the coming 12 months will again be for strong demand, that in some cases will exceed our supply, our challenge will be to manage our stocks of plants in order to minimise out of stock situations and to also balance out what we accept in forward orders so that we in fact can manage these commitments. There is no reason to believe that the growing awareness in the community of the use of indigenous plants will slow down, and we need to find ways of working to meet this demand within our ability.

In closing I would like to express our thanks to the City of Whitehorse Parks and Natural Environment Department for their ongoing assistance. I would also like to express Greenlink's and my own personal deep appreciation to all of our volunteers for the amazing job you do putting in hours and hours of work come rain, hail or shine. Greenlink cannot function the way we do without your amazing efforts and support. Greenlink is successful because of who you are.

Lastly to my fellow committee members, some of whom I know are not standing for re-election, I thank each and everyone of you for all the work you have put in over the past 12 months to ensure our continued success and for the contribution you have all made to me as President. Thank you all, it has again been a privilege to serve as President of Greenlink.

#### Treasurer's Report

Our overall result for 2023/24 shows a net surplus of \$44,967. Our income for the year was \$85,867, up by 16%.

Sales were steady with the increase attributed to higher interest rates pushing up our investment income.

Memberships were at record levels. Expenses were identical to last year in line with budget, including \$12,000 of donations into our community.

Our Equity position remains strong at \$426k meaning we are future proofed to cover any major changes to the Nursery.

#### Woody Meadow Project....One Year On

Last year, we shared news of a new trial garden planted at the rear of the nursery. Following Melbourne University's approach, we had established a low-maintenance planting with a diverse range of plant species, which will be regularly coppiced to create a bushy and aesthetically pleasing landscape.
